Climate-smart Practices for Increasing Resilience of Rural and Urban Landuses at a Watershed Scale

Abstract: Climate-smart land use can be accomplished through management practices in rural and urban areas that enhance sustainability at a watershed scale. Effects of climate change, such as changing precipitation and temperature patterns, as well as increased frequency and severity of storms, have substantial impacts on working landscapes. There is a critical need to develop adaptation strategies at site scales to mitigate these impacts. In this study, a watershed-scale simulation model is developed to study the nature of vulnerability of these sectors to climate change, quantify the influence management practices in mitigating stress, and develop watershed-wide resilience strategies in a mixed land-use watershed. The study area is Mill River- Amherst Watershed that drains into Lake Warner. The watershed has a mix of urban and rural land uses that influence the water quality of the lake and has severe nutrient and sediment contamination issues. The Generalized Watershed Loading Functions (GWLF) model will be used to simulate hydrologic processes in the watershed system using monitored data. Data on climate will be input to simulate processes over a 50 year simulation period. Outputs of the model (runoff, streamflow, including water contamination from nitrogen, phosphorus, and sediment) will be calibrated with monitored information. Climate projections from the Fifth Assessment Report (AR5) of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) will be used to simulate climate impacts on the watershed. Specific management practices will be implemented in rural and urban uses using parameterization methods to quantify mitigation of impacts and identify resilience mechanisms in the watershed. It is expected that increasing vegetative cover, landscape interventions (buffer), and practices that increase infiltration can be used to develop climate-smart practices in the watershed. The results will identify relative strengths of practices in enhancing climate-smart land use for conservation and is transferable to other watersheds.


The CD Dickinson/Howe Connection

Being a old scientist, I enjoy doing all sorts of research, including genealogy. Here is how Art Howe ended up owning the mill formerly owned by CD Dickinson.

Caleb Dexter Dickinson had three wives. The first was Typhena Russell. She bore 6 children: 5 girls and one boy. The son died when he was age 5. Typhena died in March 1848 of influenza at age 40, leaving Caleb with infant daughters.

As was the case back then, he quickly remarried in October of 1848 to Louisa Billings. She bore him three boys and two girls, but only one boy, Frederick, lived past the age of 16. Frederick did not stay in the business with his father, as by 1883 at the age of 30, he had moved to Chattanooga TN. So Caleb had no male offspring to which to hand off the mill. (At age 60 he married his third wife, Harriet Barstow)



One of his daughters from his marriage to Typhena was named Helen. Helen married John Cutler Howe. John was mechanically inclined. Before he was married to Helen, John worked in the industrial city of New Haven, CT as a mechanic. After getting married and having a child at age 32, he was living in North Hadley. He worked alongside his father in-law Caleb in the knife and broom tool mill.

When Caleb died, John Howe continued with the mill.

John Howe had two sons and three daughters. His oldest son George did not continue with the mill. At the age of 22 George was a bookkeeper and at age 46 he was a traveling salesman. The youngest son was Art Howe (1875-1966).

Art worked with his father John in the mill. His father John Howe died in 1913 when Art was age 38. Art assumed ownership of the mill.

It is interesting to note that knives made by Dickinson were embossed "CD Dickinson & Son", but Caleb never had a son work with him in the mill.
